

# Shakespearean Comedy



A Midsummer Night's Dream, As You Like It, Twelfth Night, and The Merchant Venice — these four plays are considered to be amongst the greatest comedies in English. In this course we will study each of these plays, considering how they may have been performed and understood



in Shakespeare's time as well as how they have been understood since. All are romantic comedies, plays that revolve around love as a theme. The Merchant of Venice, however, stands apart from the others because of the remarkable figure of Shylock. Therefore we will discuss this play last, paying attention both to the elements it shares with other romantic comedies and to its distinctive qualities.

Mark Rose is Distinguished Professor Emeritus at UCSB, where he taught popular Shakespeare courses for many years. He is the author of Shakespearean Design and many essays on Shakespearean topics as well as the editor of several collections of Shakespearean criticism. In addition he has published books on Elizabethan poetry, science fiction, and the history of copyright. He was educated at Princeton, Oxford, and Harvard and has taught at Yale and the University of Illinois as well as at UCSB. Last year he presented a popular VISTAS course on Shakespearean tragedies.
