L EW OPERAS have had such a discouraging start in life as Bizet's *Carmen*. Its first night at the Opéra-Comique in Paris on March 3, 1875, is now legendary as many in the audience left halfway through, scandalized by what they had heard and seen on the stage. And yet, ten years later, Carmen was the most popular opera in the world and has remained so ever since. What was the cause of this sudden turn in fortune?

At the first session of "Carmen and the Consequences," we will examine what happened and see why the score and the action horrified audiences. But Carmen, one of the great harbingers of modernity in operatic history, opened up the whole field of human sexuality for exploration by composers, librettists, and performers. In doing so it had a truly international impact.

At the second session we will evaluate the impact of Carmen on Italian opera and will center our attention on Mascagni's Cavalleria Rusticana and Leoncavallo's Pagliacci. We will continue our exploration of Carmen's

influence by traveling to Germany where we will explore Richard Strauss's shocking adaptation of Oscar Wilde's Salome. And the final session will be devoted to the Czech composer Leos Janacek's masterpiece, Katya Kabanova, recently referred to as one of the most beautiful operas of the 20th century.
